





Definition of an Indian Child

An Indian child means any unmarried person who is under age 18 and either:

- 1) Is a member or citizen of an Indian Tribe; or
- Is eligible for membership or citizenship in an Indian Tribe AND is the biological child of a member/citizen of an Indian Tribe.

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


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


ICWA applies to... ICWA applies whenever an Indian child is the subject of: A child-custody proceeding: When there is a need for out-of-home placement of the child, including Foster-care placements (including guardianships) Pre-adoptive placements Adoptive placements Termination of parental rights and Emergency proceedings. ICWA also applies to voluntary proceedings in which a placement determination is being made, status offence cases in which there is a need for out of home placement and dual status cases (when












✓ Genograms or ancestry/family charts for both parents; ✓ All known names of BOTH parents (maiden, married and former names or aliases), including possible alternative spellings; ✓ Current and former addresses of the child's parents and any extended family; ✓ Birthdates and places of birth (and death, if applicable) of BOTH parents; ✓ All known Tribal affiliations (or Indian ancestry/ fir Tribal affiliation not known) for individuals listed on the ancestry/family charts; and ✓ The addresses for the domicile and residence of the child, his or her parents, or the Indian custodian and whether this is on an Indian reservation or in an Alaska Native Village.



















































No child-custody proceeding for foster-care placement or termination of parental rights (other than emergency proceedings) may be held until: • 10 days after each Parent or Indian Custodian (or Secretary where the Parent or Indian custodian is unknown) AND the Child's Tribe has received notice. • Or up to 30 days after the Parent, Indian custodian and the Child's Tribe has received notice, if the Parent, Indian custodian or Child's Tribe has requested up to 20 additional days.

















































QEW Testimony

- They testify to:
 Whether or not the continued parental/custodian custody is likely to result in serious emotional or physical damage to the child.
 Prevailing social and cultural standards of the Child's Tribe.
 The application of foster care and adoptive placement standards (diligent search)
 Whether or not Active Efforts were sufficient in attempting to maintain or reunify the family.
- They Testify at
 - Any Proceeding involving making a decision to place an Indian child in an out-of-home placement.
 Involuntary Foster Care
 involuntary Termination of Parental Rights






CPS Active Efforts

What active Efforts should be applied when an emergency removal happens?


- Is there is anyone the parent(s) can identify to take their children.
- Involve the tribe, as soon as there is reason to know.
- Complete genogram with family at offset to identify kin and supports.
- Connect with culturally relevant services to prevent removal active efforts start before custody.
- Remember parents cannot opt out of ICWA.
- Continual assessment of the family to provide reunification as soon as imminent/impending danger or risk has been eliminated.

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Active Effort Focus Areas




- 2) Identifying appropriate services and barriers.
- 3) Working with tribal representatives to provide services and support.
 4) Diligently searching for extended family and identifying in what ways support can be offered to the family.
- Culturally appropriate family preservation strategies.



- Considering safety, visitation must be frequent and occur in the most natural setting possible.
- Frequent monitoring of progress and participation in services.
- Ensure the family has access to and is utilizing all local services.
- 10) Think outside of the box!!
- Post reunification services and monitoring.









Conducting or causing to be conducted a DILIGENT SEARCH for the Indian child's extended family members, and contacting and consulting with extended family members to provide family structure and support for the Indian child and the Indian child's parents;

A genogram was completed with the family. Below is a comprehensive, but not exhaustive list of people identified as supports for the children and family.

Renee Flood: Maternal Grandmother Support offered: Visitation with children in her home as frequently as possible.

Vine Deloria: Paternal Uncle Support offered: Offered to babysit for the children while Mom attends treatment.

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strategies and facilitating the use of remedial and rehabilitative services provided by the child's Tribe;

Contacted the ICWA director to determine what services were available and appropriate for the family.

Tribal Identified Service: HHS – physical and mental health care.

Service Provided: Doctor appointments were set for all children.

Appointment information: Both appointments set for 10/10/19

Lucy: 10:00am with Dr. E. Mertz, Pediatrician

Fred: II:00am with Dr. D. Arnez, Pediatrician

Outcome: Lucy and Lucas were both identified to be in need of Developmental assessments. Follow up appointments are set for 12/04/19.

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Example Culturally Appropriate Family Preservation

Ascertained with family to what extent they were involved in the traditional practices of their tribe. Familles will have varying levels of involvement for various reasons. Still provide them with informating as to various culturally relevant services that have been identified and can be utilized.


A pow wow is scheduled for New Year's day and the QEW identified for this case is willing to introduce the family to people who can assist in strengthening their cultural ties.


Connected family to Summer Day, a tribal community member, who will work with the family in providing cultural healing opportunities (sweat lodge). Family has been connected with the American Indian Student Services Center. They work with families to explore educational opportunities and provide access to smudge and sweet grass.















